BJB2: Sandy has offered to lead this Language Arts Discussion

TanaMo: sounds great

SandraS: did y'all introduce yourselves yet?

BJB2: before we begin, a reminder to go to the Actions menu in the top right of the chat window and then click on DETACH

KathyAP joined the room.

TanaMo: no we haven't

BJB2: Intros are next on the list, Sandy'

BJB2: Hi, Kathy. Welcome

SandraS apologizes for getting ahead of herself...

BJB2: everyone please give a brief introduction telling us where you are located and what you teach

BJB2: I'm an art teacher in Pennsylvania

SarahRB: Atlanta, Ga, Grade 7 English

TanaMo: Hi I am a kindergarten teacher in Texas

SandraS: I teach writing/literature in Huntsville AL, university

KathyAP: Hello, I am Kathy, I teach health occupations in Flowery branch Ga

SandraS: Welcome, all!

SandraS: I'd like to start by letting y'all know about a great resource

SandraS: it's a professional development resource almost as good as Tapped In!

BJB2 listens intently

SandraS: We can spend a little time talking about this resource and then move on to some topics that you might suggest.

KathyAP: Great to know, I am just checking this out for an assignment for my masters program, but it looks like it could be a great resource

SandraS: Great, Kathy!

SandraS: The resource is the National Writing Project

SarahRB: tell us how to get involved!

SandraS: I'll post the URL and you can visit for a minute...then come on back here

SandraS: http://www.writingproject.org

BJB2: hold the ctrl key down on your keyboard as you click on the url if you have a pop up blocker

SandraS: Thanks, BJ

SandraS: Everybody back here?

BJB2. o O (I always learn wonderful things from all the TI events I attend)

SandraS: I do, too

SandraS: Tana and Sarah, are you ready to hear more about the NWP?

TanaMo: yes, it sounds good

SandraS: great! let's see if we can find Sarah....

TanaMo: she is probably checking out the site

BJB2 pokes Sarah

SandraS: ha!

SandraS . o O (BJ always pokes very gently)

BJB2 nods solemnly

SandraS: NWP has been around for about 30 years

SandraS: started at UC Berkeley

SandraS: there are 3 basic tenets

SandraS: 1) teachers are the best teachers of other teachers

SandraS: 2) teachers who improve their own writing are more effective teachers

SandraS: 3) writing is a way to learn for all subject areas

SandraS: NWP has about 190 sites around the nation

SarahRB: sorry about that...signed up for their email newsletter

SandraS: (and Puerto Rico and Virgin Islands)

SandraS: oh, excellent Sarah...it's a phenomenal resources

SandraS: I've gotten lots for my teaching just from the newsletter

SandraS: so the 190 sites are at colleges, but the bulk of participants are K-12 teachers

SandraS: the core project for each site is the Summer Institute

SarahRB: I have recruited many teachers connected with various writing projects for a video production I worked on. I am very impressed with the organization

SandraS: for instance, our summer institute at Alabama A&M University is currently having its summer institute

SandraS: wow!

SandraS: Sarah, please tell us more about this video

SarahRB: it was a professional development series for language arts teachers K-12 called Envisioning Literature, produced for Annenberg/CPB

SandraS: sounds excellent

SarahRB: the tapes are available for free via satellite and I along with some colleagues wrote a lot of the online ancillary materials

SarahRB: web site address coming...

TanaMo: what's the website

SandraS nods

TanaMo: oh ok

SandraS . o O (this is why I love Tapped In....I always learn so much!)

BJB2 agrees and wonders if Sarah would like to lead a future discussion on the project

SandraS: oooh, excellent idea!

BJB2: if you're interested, Sarah, email me at <u>bjb@tappedin.org</u> and we can discuss dates and times

SandraS . o O (Sarah is still retrieving url...)

SarahRB: www.learner.org/envisioningliterature/

SandraS: Tana, you know you'll have a transcript of this talk emailed to you?

TanaMo: yes I know

TanaMo: thanks

SandraS: this is soooo cool....I can give this resource to the teachers in our summer

institute

SandraS: the summer institute (SI) usually lasts about 4 weeks

SarahRB: the project was based on Dr. Judith Langer's research from CELA in

ALBANY, http://cela.albany.edu

SandraS: you're there with teachers from all grade levels and all subject matters

SandraS: excellent, Sarah...I'm looking forward to finding out more...I'll finish my spiel

on NWP and then we can talk about the literature project, if y'all want to do that

TanaMo: yes

SandraS: at our SI participants get \$1000 stipend

SandraS: but that varies from site to site

SandraS: we've got 14 participants

SandraS: 3 special ed/learning disabled

SarahRB: the actual project pays the 1,000?

SandraS: 2 high school, one math, one science

SandraS: yes.

SarahRB: wow!

SandraS: each site has a different stipend, different process

SandraS: our stipend might be higher than some

SandraS: but once you go through a Summer Institute, you become what's called a Teacher Consultant

SarahRB: it's nice teachers are being compensated for professional development

SandraS agrees wholeheartedly with Sarah

SandraS: when you become a TC, you can then participate in any NWP program

SandraS: for instance, writing retreats in Santa Fe in the summer...

SandraS: wonderful

SarahRB: is there any connection to the IB program in New Mexico with the NWP writing programs in Santa Fe?

SandraS: IB program?

SarahRB: International Baccalaureate

SandraS: I don't think so...

SandraS: Santa Fe has Sunrise Springs, a beautiful resort

SandraS: and that's where the writing retreats are held

SandraS: but for instance, this year, we're doing a Professional Writing Retreat on Writing and Technology

SandraS: that will be at a lodge in Nebraska

SarahRB: are there ways to use NWP as a resource during the school year, if we haven't yet participated in the summer institute?

SandraS: one of the main points that NWP makes is that school reform needs to come from the inside, from teachers

SandraS: Yes, you can use the resources on the website and also use the publications

SandraS: The Voice is the newsletter, The Quarterly is a journal with all teachers as audience

SandraS: both publications are online

SarahRB: how do you become a summer institute participant?

SandraS: find a site near you...

SandraS: there's a map on the website

TanaMo: 190 locations right

SandraS: yup!

SandraS: let's go see what sites are near both of you.....

TanaMo: I have already found one

SarahRB: just found it...thanks

TanaMo: they are mostly located at Universities

SandraS: yes, they are all located at universities

SandraS: I think it works out really well, because you get education schools involved

SandraS: and great k-12-university collaborations

SandraS: each summer institute advertises for participants and you just apply

SandraS: if you wanted to find out more about the NWP site near you, just call up the director and see if you can talk with him/her

SandraS: I did my first summer institute in 2003

SandraS: and I just keep getting more and more involved

TanaMo: that's awesome

SandraS: I think because NWP also believes teachers' voices are critical

BJB2 . o O (Sandy also leads a monthly WriteTalk discussion here in Tapped In)

SandraS: that's why they do so much publishing, teacher inquiry, research

SandraS: yes....thanks for reminding me BJ

SandraS: WriteTalk is an online writing group here

SandraS: it's meant to support professional writing, writing about our profession of teaching

BJB2: you can read the archives of past discussions at <u>www.tappedin.org/transcripts</u>

SandraS: and we talk about writing across the curriculum

SandraS: our last session was on using writing to reflect on our teaching

SandraS: a recent publication of the NWP is called Rural Voices

SandraS: there's a whole rural sites network and so a group of teachers did research on how

SandraS: place-based education can enrich the classroom

SandraS: then they published a volume of their research

SandraS: it's a wonderful piece...and shows how you can use place-conscious education anywhere

SandraS: not just rural places

SandraS: Tana, we've got a couple kindergarten teachers in our summer institute

SandraS: what's so cool is that as a college professor, I can learn from their knowledge

SandraS: it's a wonderful way to network

TanaMo: sounds like a great place to collaborate

SandraS: whenever I'm around NWP folk, I am so proud to be a teacher....I always meet passionate, creative teachers and writers

SandraS: it is... and you can usually tell a school that has a couple Teacher Consultants there...they often end up collaborating within the school

SandraS: any questions/comments about NWP?

SarahRB: sounds great! I'd love to get involved

SandraS: Please do! the site near you would be lucky to have you participate!

TanaMo: no sounds awesome, would like to look into it more

SandraS: wonderful, Tana!

SandraS: do either of you have a topic you'd like to discuss?

SandraS: or do we want to put Sarah on the spot and listen to her talk about her work on the video project?

TanaMo smiles

SarahRB: it's up to everyone here...

SandraS: what would you like to do, Tana?

TanaMo: I would like to hear more Sarah

SarahRB: I'm interested in hearing about newspapers in the classroom, if anyone knows anything about that?

SandraS: me, too

SandraS: ooh....

SandraS: like online zines?

SarahRB: more like using the newspaper as a nonfiction reading

SandraS: or publications coming from journalism classes.....

TanaMo: I use a lot of magazines, haven't worked much on newspapers

SarahRB: activity, vocabulary builder, etc.

SarahRB: instead of buying nonfiction anthologies

SandraS: ahhh....

SarahRB: we decided to use newspapers this year...

SandraS: ok, my son uses it in 7th grade social studies

SandraS listens to Sarah

BJB2: obituaries are a great writing prompt

SarahRB: just trying to figure out a framework for reading and writing where it is meaningful

SarahRB: for the students

TanaMo: We briefly touch on the subject of newspapers in Kindergarten

SandraS: I've got to hear about the obituaries, Bi

SandraS: and about kindergarten use, Tana

SarahRB: obits! funny, but actually the NY Times has the most interesting ones!

BJB2: who were the presidents during the person's lifetime, what changes in technology did he see, what year was he born

SarahRB: that's interesting

BJB2: tons of topics

SandraS: that is a cool idea...so it's more research based...imaginary based?

BJB2: probably more research based

BJB2 . o O (if you want to tie it in with social studies)

SandraS: never thought of obits as such a creative source

SandraS: my mind is spinning off with possibilities

SarahRB: wrote down the idea, thanks!

SandraS: how do you introduce newspapers in kindergarten, Tana?

TanaMo: I basically use them as another source for gaining information, and there is a kids page in the local paper here in Houston.

SandraS: oh, cool....

TanaMo: it has fun facts that the kids really enjoy

SandraS: bridge from pre-reading to reading, too?

TanaMo: yes

TanaMo: I use magazines a lot though

SandraS: my son's 7th grade class assignment is to pick out an article on a topic, either

state or national

SandraS: then they have to summarize article

SandraS: but that would bore me to death.

SandraS: so BJ's idea about the obituaries is much more intriguing to me

SarahRB: yes, bore me too

SandraS: so what were your initial thoughts about using newspapers, Sarah...what do

you want to accomplish?

SarahRB: I was thinking imitating different writing styles in the sections of the

paper...editorials, etc.

SarahRB: I want to stimulate an interest in nonfiction reading

TanaMo: I remember having to find an article in a news paper and writing my own

version of what happened and reporting it to the class

SarahRB: the anthologies the kids were using of real life stories were soooo bad

BJB2: comics are a good resource too...and political cartoons for the older kids

SarahRB: cartoons--great idea!

TanaMo: that's a great idea

SandraS: I still haven't read Ralph Fletcher and JoAnn Portalupi's Non-Fiction Crafts

SandraS: but I've bet they've got something about newspapers

SarahRB: what are those about?

SandraS: multiple intelligences....humor....art

SandraS: excellent resources....

SandraS: Fiction Crafts

SandraS: Non-Fiction Crafts

SarahRB: crafts as in arts and crafts?

SandraS: almost a series of mini-lessons on how to incorporate crafts

SarahRB: neat

SandraS: ok, see this word was very confusing to me at first

BJB2: are you familiar with Daryl Cagle's comics page?

SarahRB: no...

SandraS: as a college prof., never heard anyone say "writing crafts"

SandraS: but in middle school, Fletcher uses the phrase to indicate various skills

SarahRB: there are text books called the Writer's Craft

SandraS: like writing in first person

BJB2: http://www.cagle.com/

MelissaIM joined the room.

BJB2: there's a teacher's guide too

BJB2: Hi, Melissa. Welcome

SandraS: cool, BJ!

MelissaIM: Thanx, I'm just popping in for a minute

SandraS: Melissa, we're talking about using newspapers in the classroom

SandraS: Sarah wants to incorporate newspapers in an engaging way

SandraS: to promote vocabulary building, writing, recognition of different types of writing

SandraS wonders if she articulated that right...

MelissaIM: great!

SarahRB: yes...you're right on

MelissaIM: I have to run back to my cadre, I'll check out the transcript!

MelissaIM left the room.

SandraS: thanks for dropping in Melissa

TanaMo: sounds like there

SandraS: oops, she sped out too fast

TanaMo: sounds like there's a lot you can with newspaper s

BJB2: Ads are also good for budgeting, shopping, planning a career

SandraS: ooh, another great idea....

BJB2 . o O (classified ads)

SandraS: of course, then you've got the personals....

TanaMo: hmmm

BJB2: teens are going to buy a new car....what do they have to know

SandraS: which can be a hoot...imagine if 7th graders wrote personals but for another student in the class...

BJB2: yes, personals can be cool

SandraS: I'm thinking there's got to be some material with rhetorics folk, or maybe in journalism....

SandraS: the director of Oklahoma State Writing Project is a journalism teacher

SandraS: I met her last year at the writing retreat

SandraS: I bet she would have some great ideas.

SarahRB: personals would be hilarious

SandraS: I'll email her and then send the info to you, Sarah, if you'd like

SarahRB: that would be great!

SandraS: Also, local papers often have a section devoted to student writers...

SandraS: I know the Huntsville Times does

BJB2: how about inviting her to be a guest during one of your discussions, Sandy?

SandraS: so students could write letters...

SandraS: brilliant suggestion, BJ....

SandraS: the thing about newspapers is that it can really help students understand authentic audience...

SarahRB: yeah...that seems to be key in motivating middle schoolers

SandraS: if they're writing an opinion letter to go to the newspaper, that's a vastly different project than writing a paper to be graded

SandraS: yes, and there are lots of other ideas for authentic audiences, Sarah....

BJB2: sports reporting is popular for that age group

SandraS: which is one of the reasons I asked you what you were trying to accomplish with the newspapers

SarahRB: I was even thinking after the students sample the different styles of reading, imitate the writing styles of the paper sections, and then build a one-issue paper for the classroom

SandraS: that sounds really good, Sarah

SandraS: you could also appeal to the different learning strengths in the class by creating a newspaper staff

SandraS: cartoon editor

SandraS: editorial editor

SandraS: advertising

SandraS: students could solicit opinion letters from students outside of class

SandraS: oops!

SandraS: it's 8pm...

BJB2: you can do that on a small scale with kinders too

SarahRB: thanks so much for all of these terrific ideas!
