KarenL: Oh dear. My name is Karen. I'm a library media specialist in an elementary school in Detroit

LynneW: We were just looking at a Web 2.0 reference wiki.

KarenL: love wikis!

KarenL: need to learn more. . .

LynneW: I have posted the links to the sites we are visiting today. These links are located just below the Web 2.0 graphic.

KarenL: ooh, readwritethink is excellent!

JaneOst: helpful resource for definitions and differentiating between the tools

LynneW: Exactly what I thought Jane

LynneW: Who is back from the wiki visit?

TerriG: I'm back

JenniferVG: I'm back

JaneOst: I am. I also like the links to articles

KarenL: I'm back. Need to bookmark the emerging technologies.

LynneW: How would you use this site?

LynneW: Would you be a contributing member?

LynneW: Has anyone added information to a wiki you did not host?

JaneOst: first a learner, then a contributor

TerriG: not I...just learning

JaneOst: not yet

MarleneK joined the room.

LynneW: Welcome Marlene

LynneW: Please introduce yourself.

MarleneK: Thanks, sorry I'm late.

LynneW: No problem.

MaryFrancT: I am back, but not very familiar with how to use some of the technology

listed

MarleneK: I'm from Alberta, used to be a Science teacher for over 15 years.

MaryFrancT: and its benefits for a classroom

LynneW: Let's talk about that.

LynneW: What is unfamiliar?

KarenL: I could see wikis as a wonderful collaboration tool for students. . .

MaryFrancT: such as blogging

KarenL: if students were working on a research project, they could write their ideas in a

wiki and have other group members respond.

LynneW: Good idea Karen.

TerriG: right, easy access for collaboration

JaneOst: How do people edit others' work? Does it get sticky? I have only worked with

blogs

LynneW: Does anyone use instructional blogging?

KarenL: not yet.

EvelynRP joined the room.

TerriG: no,

MaryFrancT: no

LynneW: Welcome Evelyn

MarleneK: Not at this time.

JenniferVG: No, I haven't used blogging yet but want to

LynneW: I use instructional blogging for all of my education courses.

JaneOst: Can you describe instructional blogging

BjB: Evelyn, Lynne just asked if anyone used instructional blogging

LynneW: Each student becomes a content creator with their own blog

KarenL: interesting, tell us more.

LynneW: Instructional blogging is using a blog as an interactive, electronic course communication tool.

LynneW: I'll project the course blog for an undergrad ed tech class.

LynneW: Look for the "Neighborhood" and you will see links to my students' blogs.

MarleneK: How do you monitor cyber bullying on a blog, with regards to comments that others might add, or do you turn off that feature?

LynneW: Well, remember I'm working with adults.

KarenL: Wow!!!

KarenL: Impressive.

LynneW: This class met last night and we did talk about the quality and type of comments that are appropriate.

LynneW: We had a situation where one student misunderstood the comment of another. Very instructive all around.

KarenL: You know, I just became familiar with gaggle.net. It is an excellent tool for students and has parameters in place to prevent that.

TerriG: sorry, but where is the "neighborhood"

KarenL: Gaggle.net also has a blog.

BjB: text communication can be so easily misconstrued

LynneW: I asked the students, who are now in their 4th week of class, how they felt about their blogs.

KarenL: haven't used that yet.

MaryFrancT: So is this something that you could see useable in K - 12?

LynneW: Accountability came up most frequently. They feel accountable to each other to offer good work and to pay attention to each others' work.

LynneW: Terri, the "Neighborhood" is down toward the bottom of the left gutter. Just scroll down.

LynneW: There are several really good and free educational blog providers that are appropriate for K-12 use.

KarenL: edublogs.org is one.

LynneW: I like that one best.

KarenL: David Warlick has one, too.

KarenL: I think?

MaryFrancT: thanks

LynneW: Yes he does Karen

JaneOst: how do you set up the instructional blog. Is it really a web site with links to your students' blogs

LynneW: The blogs have a "front" side that is the public side and then an administrative side where the content is created and posted.

LynneW: The admin side is very similar to any type of editor.

JaneOst: great. did you use edublogs.org?

LynneW: I recommend them to my pre-service and inservice teacher students.

LynneW: I use a blog-service provider in Scotland ... blog-city

KarenL: is blog-city free?

JaneOst: I teach ESL at a community college. I think this could work for me.

EvelynRP: sorry to interrupt the flow but when you "project" should I be able to see something?

LynneW: Since my student must post all of their work to their blogs, I needed a service provider that would allow server space to host files.

LynneW: Evelyn, you should see a new browser window open up and go to the site.

KarenL: that's what I like about this blog. looks like you can host many files.

LynneW: If it doesn't, you can just click on the link.

KarenL: do you have a limit on space?

LynneW: Yes, but I never have been able to go over it.

KarenL: must be a lot of space!

LynneW: They offer free blogs but I use premium blogs for the design and content features and the file space.

LynneW: Students get to keep their blogs for one year paid.

KarenL: thanks, Lynne. that means money.

TerriG: how much is that?

LynneW: I pay less because of the number of blogs that I purchase each year. They do offer an educational discount. The public rate is \$36.00 per year.

LynneW: I pay \$10.00 per year per student blog.

LynneW: It is paid for from their course fee.

LynneW: Are you ready to visit the next site?

TerriG: yes

MaryFrancT: yes

MarleneK nods.

JenniferVG: ok

KarenL: yes

BjB: Skype As An Inclusion Tool Class Produced Video

EvelynRP: yes

LynneW: It requires Quick Time

LynneW: Hi Kathleen

KathleenJ: I know I'm late so am just listening

LynneW: Oh, Marleen. Don't bother with the video now.

LynneW: It will take too long.

LynneW: Does everyone know what Skype is?

MarleneK bookmarks for later

MarleneK: I love using skype

LynneW: Marlene, explain what Skype is and how you use it.

MarleneK: It's a free program that allows you to keep in touch with anyone around the world who also has a skype account

TerriG: wow!

MarleneK: Its like tapped in with audio

TerriG: but what does skype stand for

LynneW: Think of a free video telephone.

MarleneK: You can also develop a skypecast.. I did my first a few weeks ago. I felt like a radio talk show host.

JaneOst: That is so moving. Skype is amazing!

MaryFrancT: We are using it in my Technology and Teacher Education class at George Mason to communicate with other students in graduate programs at UVA.

MarleneK: And I joined a skypecast that was being hosted by a 12 yr old boy. He was such a diplomatic host, taking questions from participants all around the world

TerriG: unbelievable!!!

JaneOst: I agree!!

LynneW: I found Skype to be easy to install and easy to use.

DavidWe agrees with Lynne

MarleneK: It is incredibly easy to set up an account on skype and also easy to create your own skypecast

JaneOst: This would be a great way to introduce other cultures in class.

MarleneK: Its not too mac friendly with the skypecasting right now, but great on a PC

TerriG: sounds good...what's needed

JaneOst: that's good to know

MarleneK: headset, or a the speakers in your computer and a mic

LynneW: Great idea Jane. You can also record skype conversations - it is frequently done as interviews for podcasts.
