

**Title of Session:** Web Tools For Education - Ning

**Moderator:** Pam Berger

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Room: Web Tools for Education Group

**PamB** : Well, let's get started. Would you like to introduce yourself?

**BjB** : Welcome to today's WebTools for Education discussion

**JenniferKL**: I'm a grad student in IT this is my second visit to Tapped In

**PamB** : I'm Pam Berger, a library and educational technology consultant from the NYC area.

**DavidW**: I'm David Weksler. I help teachers learn more about educational technology. I'm in New Jersey, near NYC

**JenniferKL**: I'm in Knoxville, TN

**BjB** : I teach communication and am on Tapped In helpdesk. I'm in Pennsylvania

**PamB** : I thought we would explore NING tonight. Have any of you used it?

**BjB** : I have

**JenniferKL**: Yes

**PamB** : Great! Can you share your nings with us?

**JeffC**: yup

**JenniferKL**: CR 2.0, PD 2.0 and SchoolMatters, a site for general education discussion right here in East TN

**PamB** : what's the URL?

**BjB** : <http://www.classroom20.com/>

**BjB** . o O ( classroom 2.0 )

**JeffC**: ditto

**PamB** : let's look at Bj's ning and then come back

**BjB** : that's the same as Jeff's and Jennifer's

**BjB** : but I also belong to <http://arted20.ning.com/>

**JeffC**: also Teachers2.0

**JeffC**: Stop Cyberbullying and a couple of others.

**JenniferKL**: how do you guys project your thoughts like that

**JeffC**: type a colon first

**DavidW**: type :waves

**JenniferKL**: got it

**JeffC** isn't very active with Ning... should post more.

**JenniferKL** Jennifer feels like the newbie here

**JenniferKL**: it works

**DavidW**: well, you are, but you are picking up things fast

**BjB** : Jeff, that is just what Pam and David and I were discussing...

**PamB** : that's a great ning-- very active!

**BjB** : how can you possibly keep up with all the communities?!

**JenniferKL**: That's my problem too

**DavidW**: I'm not sure you CAN keep up with all the communities

**JeffC**: that's what people ask me about the groups I'm in here... it's all a matter of basically becoming way overextended.

**PamB** : I was wondering about that, Jeff.

**JeffC**: bloglines helps... but I tend to ignore a lot of them as well.

**JeffC**: not to mention the two dozen educational lists I'm on... but back to ning.

**DavidW** smiles

**JenniferKL:** My hope is to dabble in a few and find the right fit, then pare down.

**PamB:** do you have bloglines set up for the nings?

**JenniferKL:** I use it to track new posts in my nings

**PamB:** how many nings are you in?

**JenniferKL:** four, I think, plus I'm in the process of creating a private one for my family

**PamB:** so would you say ning is the new blog?

**JenniferKL:** I like the threaded discussions, not all blogs have that power

**PamB:** I agree. and the ability to share photos, start groups, etc.

**PamB:** it kind of a cross between a blog and a wiki.

**JenniferKL:** I still like my blog for personal reflections, venting, that sort of thing.

**JeffC:** I've used bloglines for a few... but like I said... I'm not heavily involved with Ning... so I tend to ignore or really gloss over what could be really great info.

**JeffC:** I look at it as one more place to show teachers where there is really cool stuff.

**PamB:** has anyone seen teachers using a ning with their classroom(s)?

**JenniferKL:** I've learned a lot by searching the forums for specific issues/tools and so on

**PamB:** on the classroom 2.0 ning?

**PamB:** well, you all know about nings....so let's move on...

**JeffC:** how *\*would\** you use ning in the classroom?

**JenniferKL:** Cr 2.0 is my go-to place right now for quick answers in forums, but I don't always get the response I need to my questions

**PamB:** what's your favorite web 2.0 tool?

**JeffC:** I suppose you could decorate it with different stuff for your students.

**JeffC:** you could repost those questions to relevant groups *\*here\**, Jennifer.

**PamB:** I would have kids form groups on the projects they are working on

**JenniferKL:** Yes, that's why I'm shifting my focus for a while

**JeffC:** so... have all your students create their own ning accounts, Pam?

**JeffC:** which means having them all create email addresses as well?

**PamB:** you don't think it a good idea?

**PamB:** my hs students all have email addresses already.

**PamB:** you can make the ning private

**JenniferKL:** yes

**JenniferKL:** My family network is private

**JenniferKL:** I'm thinking of creating avatars for the grandparents to make joining as smooth as possible

**JeffC:** I'm for it Pam... but I know a lot of districts forbid having teachers help students create email accounts.

**JeffC:** and many ban student email.

**PamB:** That's such a nice idea...you are really making me think about setting up one for my family

**JenniferKL:** that's the case here

**PamB:** but the kids have them anyway, right?

**JenniferKL:** I mean email is supposedly forbidden but kids and teachers interact with it quite frequently under the radar

**PamB:** that bugs, me. How will kids learn to live effectively and ethically without educators helping to guide them?

**JenniferKL:** agreed

**JenniferKL:** are there any networking platforms out there created specifically for school settings?

**JeffC:** what makes you think those are the goals of education?

**JenniferKL:** has anyone tried ectoLearning

**PamB** smiles at Jeff

**JeffC**: nope... what's the url, jennifer?

**JenniferKL**: give me a sec

**PamB** : no

**JenniferKL**: <http://www.ectolearning.com/ecto2>

**JenniferKL**: I don't remember how to send out a URL. did I do it in the right way?

**BjB** nods to Jennifer

**JenniferKL** whew

**JenniferKL**: I'm researching social software for purposes of new teacher mentoring and induction. Just heard about ectoLearning

**JenniferKL**: It turns out setting up networks for teachers is just as tricky because all the same filters/blocks apply, of course

**JenniferKL**: Ning is blocked in my state. Haven't checked yet on Ecto site

**JeffC** just joined ecto... why not?

**JenniferKL**: You're the guinea pig

**BjB** : ecto allows you to skype from within the environment

**PamB** : it's free...how are they supported? ads?

**PamB** : Jennifer, what other environments have you found in your research for the mentoring group?

**JenniferKL**: So far Ning, Tapped In (how it's used by TLINC) and I'm also going to explore how Moodle might work with new teachers in a learning community

**BjB** . o O ( Tapped In also has a safe and secure K-12 Student Campus, Jennifer )

**JenniferKL**: I'm reporting back to the PD supervisor for my county. We just went system-wide with a mentoring model. He wants to add e-mentoring.

**JenniferKL**: Do you think that would be the venue for a mentor-novice group of teachers?

**BjB** : teachers would be better off using a group room in Tapped In

**JenniferKL**: the K-12 campus, is it strictly for young folks?

**JenniferKL**: Ok

**BjB** : yes, K-12 is for kids...teacher creates the group room and assigns usernames and passwords

**JenniferKL**: have any of you done work with the TLINC groups from U. of Memphis, Denver, or Seattle?

**JeffC**: <http://www.wiziq.com>

**JeffC**: <http://www.yugma.com>

**JeffC**: the first is in beta, the second established... free videoconferencing for educators... there's another (I'll get it in a minute).

**JeffC**: the first also has a repository for lessons, etc. and is community oriented, whereas yugma is more for real time conferencing.

**JenniferKL**: Good -- conferencing tools. . . haven't explored any of those yet.

**DavidW**: I think there are many tools - the challenge is getting a group of teachers (at various abilities) comfortable enough that they can interact successfully

**JenniferKL**: How does Tapped In fit within the whole web 2.0 landscape? It seems to have a little of everything.

**PamB** agrees with David. It's tough.

**JenniferKL**: David, I just posted a question at PD 2.0 about my concern for who moderates and facilitates all these activities.

**JenniferKL**: Moderating also seems like a full-time job

**DavidW**: More than the technology, Jennifer, I think Tapped In was set up to try and create a community of practice for teachers - an online environment - that concept is still far from easily understood by many folks

**BjB** : Jennifer, in Tapped In each group moderates themselves

**PamB** : moderating is so important-- a group can live or die on the moderating.

**JenniferKL**: Ok, so other than the helpdesk folks, the groups keep up as little or as much

as they want.

**JeffC:** right Jennifer

**DavidW:** Pepperdine University uses Tapped in to host many classes in their online graduate ed. tech. programs

**DavidW:** They've pretty well dedicated themselves to TI

**BjB:** one thing that I think is important is that Tapped in is a Professional Development community...

**BjB:** and the members are expected to be professional in their behavior...especially in public rooms

**JenniferKL:** Well that excludes you people . . . just kidding ; )

**BjB** winks

**BjB** . o O ( we're in a group room right now )

**PamB:** BJ, have you ever had any problems with guests or members?

**DavidW** smiles

**JenniferKL:** Seriously, what would you tell a tech newbie who wants to or is required to adapt something like TI into their practice? What is the learning curve like here?

**BjB:** yes. They're banned

**BjB** . o O ( and their accounts are deleted )

**JenniferKL:** Really?

**JenniferKL:** OK

**DavidW:** I think with some effort and spending some time in Tapped In, people get comfortable pretty quickly - the hard part is if you are "being told" to use it and aren't sure why or what it might be good for

**BjB:** Jennifer, we've tried to make the learning curve as smooth as possible. One thing we do is offer tours of the community

**JenniferKL:** Agreed. How do you ensure novices will adapt this though?

**BjB** . o O ( check the calendar for tips and tricks. )

**DavidW:** If people take one of the Tips and Tricks tours, attend 3 discussions, most of the basics become pretty straightforward

**BjB** agrees with David

**JenniferKL:** Thanks, I like your specificity here. That's what I need.

**JenniferKL:** Is that pretty much how it worked for you at first?

**PamB:** They will if they build connections to other educators and find the discussion valuable to their teaching.

**DavidW:** I'm just throwing that out, Jennifer, but part of joining any community is seeing how it works, how people behave, etc.

**DavidW** agrees with Pam

**BjB:** it also helps to have specific reason for returning...like a weekly discussion with peers

**DavidW:** I think the connections can be the MOST valuable aspect of the TI community

**BjB** hugs David and Pam...we have wonderful connections!

**PamB:** I agree. One reason I come back was the connection I made with BJ

**DavidW:** Jeff and I were assisting a group of social studies teachers in the Bay Area who are hoping to use TI to do lesson studies

**PamB:** she was my mentor...still is!

**BjB:** we've all known each other for almost 10 years!

**JenniferKL:** Really?

**PamB:** has it been 10 years?

**DavidW:** The challenge today was the leader of the group allotted 20 minutes to do an introduction to TI - he had lots of other things to do, and, of course, tech problems and first-time problems got in the way

**BjB:** yep. I became a member of TI in Feb of 1998

**JenniferKL:** Back to connections. Give me an example of "feeling connected" without the F2F interaction. Again I'm the newbie here.



**DavidW:** In the last few years we have had more pre-service teachers coming to Tapped In with their education classes.

**DavidW:** I think we would like to see a connection to Tapped In for young teachers - a resource for them when they are out in the world

**BjB :** one good example of connections is the K-3 Resources group...

**JenniferKL:** Are they just lurking or is there sustained interaction and learning with the novice teachers here?

**PamB :** I think it helps to build an office and put some photos and links, etc.

**JenniferKL:** That's the aim of TLINC which is using Tapped In, but I only started reading about it this week.

**BjB :** taking ownership in your membership is important

**JenniferKL:** TLINC is Teachers Learning in Networked communities sponsored by NCTAF

**BjB .** o O ( offices, groups, buddies )

**JenniferKL:** Explain "taking ownership" please.

**PamB :** it depends on the program as much as the technology environment

**BjB :** create your own membership account, edit your profile, create an office and learn how to use the features

**JenniferKL:** I joined in June for an online class, this is the first time I've returned. I'm one of those slacker members.

**BjB .** o O ( the best way to learn is by doing )

**JenniferKL:** Before I forget, how do I make sure to receive a transcript of this?

**BjB :** Pam, our time is almost up. You'll be meeting again on November 7?

**DavidW:** After you logout, Jennifer, it will come to your email

**PamB :** yes. Nov 7

**JenniferKL:** great!

**BjB** : Jennifer, check out [www.infosearcher.com](http://www.infosearcher.com)

**PamB** : thanks...this was enjoyable. Good luck Jennifer.

**JenniferKL**: OK, "see" you again soon.

**BjB** : that will give you a glimpse of how much Pam has to contribute to the Tapped In community!

**DavidW**: Great questions, Jennifer

**DavidW** agrees with Bj

**JenniferKL**: Thanks to everyone!

**PamB** : Good night everyone.

**BjB** : thanks, Pam.

**BjB** waves goodnight
