MidgeF: OK Last time we investigated the Google stuff for educators

MidgeF: http://www.google.com/educators/activities.html

MidgeF: That link was for the activities Google offers

BJB2: just learned about Google Lit Trips...incredible!

MidgeF: Google is more than a search engine these days and I am currently writing a book about the things they offer that will be of use to teachers and their students

MidgeF: Pardon my bad typing today, Writing all day does make for tired fingers

MidgeF: To use most of the great things at Google, you need a Google account

BJB2: is it difficult to get a google account?

MidgeF: No very easy and free

MidgeF: http://www.google.com/accounts

BJB2: are you getting the urls ok, Melissa and Hannah?

BJB2 . o O (a reminder that all urls will be in your transcripts)

HannahN: yes, if you have a gmail account is that the same one?

MidgeF: If you have a Gmail email account you use that, if not, you enter a valid email address

MelissaPer: yes, I didn't realize that you could have a google account

MelissaPer: I always thought it was just a search engine only

MidgeF: The account is so the apps that they have are hidden privately

MidgeF: if you choose to use them

MelissaPer: ok

MidgeF: It is OK for this session if you don't have one right now.

MidgeF: I thought I'd tell you about a couple of them tonight that you might think are

good

MidgeF: One is called iGoogle

MidgeF: and you need a Google Account to set it up.

MidgeF: You can go and see the introduction page for it without signing up

MidgeF: www.google.com/ig

MidgeF: sorry forgot the beginning

MidgeF: http://www.google.com/ig

MidgeF: notice the ending is ig for iGoogle

MidgeF: Anyway, if you get there and it asks you to sign in don't worry.

MidgeF: I'll tell you about it.

MidgeF: iGoogle is a customizable home page that is fun

MidgeF: Once you are signed into a Google account, you can set one up with that URL

MidgeF: On the page you are "making" are tiny applications you add called Gadgets

MidgeF: A gadget ranges from completely silly

MidgeF: to very useful.

MidgeF: Are you all OK?

BJB2 nods

HannahN: yes

MelissaPer: yes

MidgeF: I would say that they are getting a Google Account. That takes a bit and involves getting an email to respond to

MidgeF: Good! I have talked to myself a lot today and am getting used to it.

BJB2: Midge, how would a 4th grade teacher use this application?

MidgeF: on my iGoogle page, I have a gadget that tells me the phases of the moon

BJB2 . o O (or how would a high school teacher use it?)

HannahN: I was checking out the gadgets, they are pretty cool!

MidgeF: Which is often part of 4th or 5th grade science

MelissaPer: Getting the account is easy and the gadgets are very neat

MidgeF: It is also important to know when it is a full moon

MidgeF: Great!

BJB2 nods solemnly.

MidgeF: There are so many I spent about 2 hours trying them out

MelissaPer: I could see how the word of the day would be good for an English teacher

MidgeF: They are easy to move around on the page. Drag by the title bar of the gadget

MelissaPer: Even the quote of the day could be useful to bring about a writing exercise.

MidgeF: Yes! I love all the language ones.

MidgeF: I have the This day in History

MidgeF: and the National Geographic picture of the day

MelissaPer: it will take some time to play with this

MidgeF: I also have the date and Time and the weather

BJB2: for English there is also the How to of the day...very cool

MidgeF: It is a good thing to look at when I first use my computer in the morning

MidgeF: The directions say that tech savvy teens can make gadgets of their own.

MidgeF: I put some fun stuff on another tab like an aquarium and some fireworks

MidgeF: My favorite thing is the background theme that you can pick..

MidgeF: I put the GRE Word of the day on today (hoping to make me smarter)

BJB2 smiles

BJB2 . o O (did it work?)

MidgeF: The good thing is at the top of the page you can quickly sign out of your Google account

MidgeF: or return to the regular Web search page

HannahN: This is great... I can see myself spending way too much time playing with this

MidgeF: At the very bottom of the page is the Help link

MidgeF: There is something else I have used called pageflakes which is much like this

MidgeF: You can make this a classroom page with this link that is very long

MidgeF: http://www.google.com/support/bin/answer.py?answer=25557&ctx=sibling

MidgeF: Are you having fun?

HannahN: yes!

MelissaPer: a new toy to play with

MidgeF: The more you add and delete the gadgets the better you get at it and find the

ones

MidgeF: you think would be good for the classroom

MidgeF: OK lets try out something else I found

MelissaPer: yes - I can see teacher using this

MelissaPer: I will use this when I begin to teach

MidgeF: This one doesn't involve the Google Account and is very good for anyone even

those who aren't teachers

HannahN: This would be fun for the students too

MidgeF: I think iGoogle would be good practice for students to learn to make decisions

about what is good and what is just stupid

MidgeF: The other one I wanted to show you is called Google SMS

MidgeF: When you are ready, let me know

HannahN: ready

MidgeF: (Hard to stop playing with iGoogle, I know)

MidgeF: OK

MidgeF: SMS means Short Message Service and is another way of using text messaging

MidgeF: You can try it out at Google without using your cell phone

MidgeF: But, it can be done with your cell phone if you have text messaging as part of your cell package

MidgeF: http://www.google.com/mobile/sms/

MidgeF: See the cell phone simulator?

MidgeF: A little ways down on the page are the things you can do with this

MidgeF: my favorites are weather and glossary

MidgeF: I see that since you are not here, you must have figured it out!

HannahN: got it

MidgeF: To use this with a cell phone with txt messaging

MelissaPer: ok

MidgeF: you start a new text message (and clear any signature you set up before)

MidgeF: so you have a blank screen

MidgeF: you type your "operator word" like weather then a space and the zipcode of the place you want to see the weather

MidgeF: then you send the txt to 46645 which is GOOGL

MidgeF: In a bit, they will txt you the weather

MidgeF: I like this when I am away and want to know the weather back home

MidgeF: Now, some schools don't allow cell phones in school but that might change

MidgeF: I listened to a lecture about Cell phones in education and learned a lot about things you can do with a cell phone

MidgeF: It was very cool. I downloaded the session to my iPod. but you can see it online, I think

MidgeF: Kids might beg to use the simulated cell phone to look up words on the screen

MidgeF: I hope you are having fun with this!
