classes

**BJB2**: I'm going to be showing you urls...

**TracyN**: I use photos for creative writing.

BJB2: when I do, hold down the ctrl key when you click on the url or turn off pop up

blockers

**BJB2**: the first site is from the National Archives and is a relatively new site

TracyN: okay

**BJB2**: http://www.digitalvaults.org/#

TracyN: got it

ElizabethE: got it

ArianneM: got it!

JanetHun: Got it too

**BJB2**: that site has enough info to keep you busy for a year!

**BJB2**: a reminder that the urls will be in your transcripts

**TracyN**: it really does...nice

**JanetHun**: We've looked at some pretty graphic Hiroshima images & survivor artwork. If the kids have background knowledge they handle it pretty well.

TracyN: I agree

**SusanR**: how incredible the photos are

TracyN: yet sad

ElizabethE: that's our world for ya

**BJB2**: wouldn't it be wonderful if happy things gave us cause to change our world?

ElizabethE: yes

**BJB2**: I like this next site because it gives you a photographer's eye view of the photos
