KatherineP: What a great picture. We're reading Night of the Twisters and this would be a great story starter!

BJB2: cool, Katherine.

BJB2: you can subscribe to the daily posts

MelissaMen: yes

KateSmi: I like that it has the watermark/siggie, I'm assuming that one can copy the image to maybe ppt--esp. when we may not have web access?

BJB2: good idea, Susan

SusanR: 500 days of earth shots

BarbaraAD: The pictures are great.

BethanyLC: this would be a great site to take about ten pictures from and have students create a story with all of them

BJB2: or take one photo and tell the story from an object in the photo's point of view

KateSmi: Ooh, that's a cool perspective!

ToryD: I like the idea of using the pictures to tell a story

ToryD: I liked the 500 days of earth shots collage

BethanyLC: What if you had students all collectively write descriptive words using the picture

YvonneF: Wow what a great site.

BethanyLC: You could then use that to incorporate into stories

KatherineP: that's a good idea

ToryD: I agree

ToryD: OMG I wish I could take pictures like this

MattG: I would use a smartboard and cover most of the picture Have the kids write about what they see. Then erase more and more. At each stage have the kids add to their story.

BJB2 smiles...maybe we'll see your photos posted some day, Tory!

ToryD: Don't count on it! LOL

BJB2: good idea, Matt

BJB2: ready for my next resource?

MattG: yes

KateSmi: RW&A

ToryD: yep

KatherineP: I like your idea Matt

BethanyLC: I really like that! It forces you to condense

KateSmi: Nah, I'm a happy muddler ;)

ToryD: I agree Bethany

BJB2: I think that you could use any topic, but the memoir idea is so poetic...down to the bare bones of language

YvonneF: Now it works, very thought provoking

BethanyLC: It's really along the lines of critical thinking for language arts. I like it a lot.

MelissaMen: really cool

JeffC: just copy/paste in the full address... hyperlinking is automatic here.

ToryD: interesting. I will be using this one!

KateSmi: Oy! Thanks!

YvonneF: Did anyone else take a look at the Wikipedia video? Very interesting

KateSmi: No, I'm going to check it now!

BethanyLC: I haven't seen the video...I'm searching throughout the site right now

BarbaraAD: I was busy reading about gossip and the value of it.

JeffC: try and accept popups from this site (best)... that way you won't have to hold the Ctrl key down.

YvonneF: It's down a ways (midwest speak for a "pretty good distance")

ToryD: wow....that is crazy. that video is an eye opener

MattG: Wow. I could tell a story about getting lost on the site and not being able to get back in.
