**BJB2**: Welcome to this month's Arts and Literacy discussion, Christine, Tammy and Sherrie

**BJB2**: have any of you participated in this discussion before?

**SherrieC**: my school is big on literacy no matter what the discipline is. My students read in Spanish and I'm always trying to bring the arts (artwork and music) into our classroom

**ChristineH**: I am working through my master's in administration certification. This site was referenced by our professor.

**BJB2**: I do have one mega site that I think we can adapt for each of your needs...

**BJB2**: I'm going to show you the url and then each of you can explore and report back on how you might use the resource...sound good?

**SherrieC**: sounds good

TammyI: Ok

**ChristineH**: sounds great

**BJB2**: everyone likes movies...and this is an amazing resource

**ChristineH**: works for me

**BJB2**: you may need to hold down the ctrl key on your keyboard to override pop up blockers

**ChristineH**: ok I am way new. I can't copy and paste it and it won't connect as a link. What do I do?

**BJB2**: did you hold down the ctrl key, Christine?

**BJB2**. o O (check on any minimized windows you might have)

**ChristineH**: I did hold down the control key. My husband has a few minimized windows but none have gone to this site. I will type it in the old fashioned way

**BJB2**: Christine, you can also go to the Actions menu in the top right of the chat...and select Send to Pasteboard

**BJB2**: you can then highlight and copy the url and paste it into a new browser window

**BJB2**: I'm looking at the Library of Congress Motion Picture and Reading Room

**BJB2**: http://www.loc.gov/rr/mopic/

**BJB2** wonders how everyone is doing. Did you find anything useful?

**ChristineH**: I went to a spider video and got an error report that shut me out. I am going to try again. This site looks awesome.

**TammyI**: On the first site I briefly saw that there were several MP3 files to download. I like the audio potentials... I do not think that I would use entire films. I wanted to find quick ways to intrigue students and get them interested on a particular topic.

SherrieC: there are videos on Spain's civil war - I love it

**BJB2**: I found some video on animation that was pretty cool

**BJB2**: you could use parts of just about any of those topics as discussion starters...or story starters

**TammyI**: This first site seems a lot like United Streaming to me.

**BJB2**: yes, it's probably very similar

**BJB2** . o O ( but free )

**BJB2**: is anyone familiar with National Gallery of Art for Kids?

SherrieC: no

**TammyI**: I think that students would love to watch movie clip introductions on various topics.

**TammyI**: I am not familiar with this site.

**BJB2** agrees with Tammy

**BJB2**: take a few minutes to explore NGAKids

**BJB2**: one suggestion would be to use the interactive sites to have kids create art and then write about their creation

**SherrieC**: I like the idea on NGAkids for students to create their own artwork. I see this being useful in my Spanish class

**SherrieC**: by mimicking Spanish artists and then writing about their work

BJB2: ahhh...fun idea, Sherrie

**ChristineH**: This site does remind me of United Streaming as well. I love it.

**BJB2**: you can also search the main NGA site

**TammyI**: I think that kids will produce some great work in creative writing after they have had the opportunity to create their own artwork for inspiration.

SherrieC: exactly

**SherrieC**: its hard for my students to write based off of Spanish artwork but I think they would do better by creating their own first

**BJB2**: your students are high school, Sherrie?

SherrieC: yes

**BJB2**: would Mexican art be a good topic?

**SherrieC**: yes - we do talk some about Freda and Diego

**BJB2** nods...exactly what I was thinking. Rivera can be introduced as a graffiti artist

**SherrieC**: very true

**BJB2**: and kids will buy into a discussion about murals...it's a contemporary issue

**TammyI**: What is WPA?

**SherrieC**: connections with other disciplines ... always a must!

**BJB2**: WPA is work project admin, I think...initiated during the great depression

**TammyI**: Ok, thanks.

**BJB2**: works progress admin...I was close ;-)

**BJB2**: other projects employed builders...I think dams were built during this period, but I'm out of my field ;-)

**ChristineH**: Thanks for the info. Great sites.

**TammyI**: I can not think of any questions for you at the moment.

**BJB2**: then let me find some stuff for your 4th graders

**TammyI**: Thank you.

**BJB2**: what about quilting?

**TammyI**: I am not quite sure how that would tie in...

**BJB2**: are you familiar with story quilts?

**TammyI**: I think that I may need a refresher.
