LynneW: The top right hand corner of this chat module has an ACTIONS drop down

menu.

**LynneW**: Do you see it?

JenniferCH: I see it.

LynneW: Click on it and select LARGER TEXT

JenniferCH: Thanks. Got it.

**LynneW**: Once the chat gets going you can go back to the ACTIONS menu and select

## DETACH

LynneW: That will give you a much larger chat window - which means less scrolling.

**LouisL** joined the room.

LynneW: Hi Louis

LynneW: Welcome

**LouisL**: Good evening all from Madison WI:)

SusanSi: Last time I went to "detach" I got kicked off

**LouisL**: whew detach worked

**LynneW**: Great - that function should not initiate a bump off the system.

**LynneW**: The chat module can go to the back of any open windows.

SusanSi: OK, it worked this time!

LynneW: Good job.

**JudyW** joined the room.

LynneW: Hi Judy

SusanSi: Hey, Judy!!!

JudyW: Hey! I'm here!

LynneW: Welcome to our special interest group professional development session

LouisL: hello Judy

**JudyW**: Hi everyone. This is new to me, so I'll just listen.

**LynneW**: To make this chat experience easier, there are two features you can enable.

**LynneW**: Go to the ACTIONS drop down menu - upper right of this chat module.

LynneW: Select LARGER TEXT

LynneW: Then, go back to the ACTIONS menu and select DETACH

LynneW: The chat module will detach from this window and become its own window.

**LynneW**: This gives more room for text with less scrolling.

**LynneW**: I am the founder/facilitator for this group

LouisL: Thanks Lynne

LynneW: Sure -

LynneW: I am a former ed tech teacher educator from the Pacific NW

**BJB2** . o O ( we usually start all Tapped In discussions with introductions )

**LynneW**: Please introduce yourselves. Tell us where you are from and how you are affiliated with education.

**LynneW**: Anyone at any time.

**SusanSi**: I teach 4th grade in rural Northeast Texas

**JenniferCH**: High school science teacher from Kentucky.

**JudyW**: I teach 4th grade language arts in the same school w/ Susan

**LynneW** smiles

**BJB2**: retired teacher in Pennsylvania and on Tapped In helpdesk

**LouisL**: I am Louis Loeffler, an Assistant Professor of Instructional Technology at Cardinal Stritch University in Milwaukee, WI - we just started an online masters focusing on Web 2.0 use so this is a great workshop

**LynneW**: As we begin, I would like to invite each of you to join this group.

**LynneW**: Joining or not, this room and its hundreds of resources are available to anyone 24/7

**LynneW**: If you join, you will receive reminder emails for each month's session.

**BJB2** enters instructions on how to join the group.....this will be in your transcript....

**LynneW**: Once you leave Tapped In, a transcript will be emailed to you with all of the

chat, including links. That way you don't have to take notes.

**BJB2**: go to the web window and scroll down on the welcome note to the sentence This is the group room for Web 2.0 Tools. There is a green i in the sentence. Click on the green i and join the group

**LynneW**: On the desktop above this chat module is a poster created at a free web2.0 site. You can customize your own motivational posters for use in a web environment and/or for bulletin boards, etc.

**LynneW**: You simply upload the graphic of your choosing, select the frame color and type in your motivational message.

LouisL joined

**LynneW**: Below that image is a listing of previous sessions. These are all archived and available at any time.

**BJB2** cheers for Louis

**LynneW**: There are hundreds of resources organized in folders by type/function.

**LynneW**: They are located under LINKS upper far left and below the school room graphic.

**LynneW**: Again, these are available 24/7.

**LynneW**: Questions?

LynneW: Seeing none...

**LouisL** sees them to left of poster

LynneW: Thank you Louis.

**LynneW**: Far left. The links under WELCOME are what we may explore this evening.

**LynneW**: I would like to begin asking you - what is web 2.0 and what makes it appealing for educational uses?

**LynneW**: Anyone can chime in.

LynneW: If you don't know - please indicate.

LouisL: Collaboration

LynneW: Yes

**JenniferCH**: Web 2.0 is working in a group to create content and studnets are more effective if they can work in groups.

**JudyW**: That's why I'm here. To find out how this will help me be a better teacher

**MarleneK** joined the room.

**LynneW**: Web 2.0 isn't itself solely working in groups. Web 2.0 products and utilities can facilitate group work.

LynneW: Hi Marlene

**BJB2**: welcome, Marlene. Lynne has asked for what describes Web 2.0

**MarleneK**: Hi sorry to be late.

**LynneW**: Marlene - please introduce yourself to the group.

**LouisL**: allow you to do work from web and use tools not installed locally - so accessible from all places

MarleneK: I'm a classroom teacher from Alberta.

**LynneW**: Thank you Marlene.

LynneW: Louis is correct.

**LynneW**: The generational change from Web 1.0 (focused on users molding themselves to the hardware and software) to Web 2.0

**LynneW**: is the hardware/software are web based and require no special training or experience.

**LynneW**: This is great for teachers because they can leapfrog over Web 1.0 requirements and easily navigate in a Web 2.0 world.

**LynneW**: Questions or observations?

**LynneW**: I'll move on.

LouisL: one more - web 2.0 is also about creating content rather than consuming

**LynneW**: The ISTE bookstore has a Web 2.0 Tools for Schools book. I've uploaded a .pdf file that is an excerpt of that book.

**LynneW**: You will find the link directly under today's date in the WELCOME table.

**LynneW**: Yes Louis - and that is a major difference between web 1.0 and web 2.0

**LouisL** opened excerpt - thanks!

LynneW: All are welcome to download the file - or any files located here.

LynneW: Let's skip down to Landmark Web Tools.

**SusanR** joined the room.

**LynneW**: Here you will find free web 2.0 tools that are a big help to students and teachers. There is a citation generator and more.

LynneW: Hi Sue.

**SusanR** waves and listens

**LynneW**: Please feel free to go to this link and check it out. Come back here in few minutes and let me know you are back.

**LynneW**: http://landmark-project.com/

SusanR: got it

**LouisL**: There as well

**BJB2**: a reminder if you are new to Tapped In to hold down the ctrl key on your keyboard when you click on the url

**BJB2** . o O ( or turn off your pop up blockers )

**LouisL** is following David's twitters - another Web 2.0 tool

**JenniferCH**: Overwhelming...but fantastic.

LynneW thinks Louis is great at creating teachable moments.

**LynneW**: The Web 2.0 Tools are listed to the far right on the Landmark web site.

**JudyW**: Amazing. I could spend a long time studying this site.

**SusanSi**: I'm interested in podcasting

**LynneW**: Well, hang on to your hats for our next resource.

**LynneW**: Before we go there, Louis mentioned Twitter.

**LynneW**: Any twitter users here?

**LouisL** raises his hand

LynneW raises her hand

**LynneW**: Louis, tell us what Twitter is and why you use it.

**LouisL**: twitter (<a href="http://www.twitter.com">http://www.twitter.com</a>) is "micro blogging" or kind of a what are you doing right now

LouisL: I use it to share web sites

**LouisL**: or to say "I am snowshoeing with my wife)

**LouisL**: or anything in between

**LouisL**: I gather from it what other people are doing

**LouisL**: and find good resources

LouisL done

**LynneW**: This micro blogging is emerging as a way to communicate where you are at a conference (to other attendees) and to post resources shared in training, pro dev sessions.

**LynneW**: It is an example of social networking.

**SusanR** raises her hand too

**LynneW**: Let's visit Web 2.0 Cool Tools for Schools

**LynneW**: At that wiki site, you will see buttons organized by function/type of learning strategy.

**LynneW**: When you click on that button - say "Collaboration" - you will see numerous resources.

**LynneW**: Check out a few and then come back here to share with the group.

**LynneW**: http://cooltoolsforschools.wikispaces.com/

LynneW: Choose any category/strategy that best fits your needs.

LouisL Excellent

MarleneK: Interesting Traffic Feed on the left!

**LynneW** smiles

**LouisL**: rats - Babblestream is not working

**JenniferCH**: The creativity tools link is great!

LynneW: Bummer Louis.

**JudyW**: Can't wait to explore the Writing section.

LouisL: I'll find another

**LynneW**: It may be time of night. Traffic on the site could be heavy.

**LouisL** likes the idea of TeamViewer

LynneW: Louis which category is that found in?

LouisL: Collaborative

LynneW: Thanks

**LouisL**: 3rd from bottom b4 Blogs and Wikis

**SusanSi**: I like the teaching ideas in Edublogs

LouisL agrees

**LynneW**: Who is back now for discussion?

**MarleneK**: This is an amazing list of tools.

LynneW: Glad you like it!

LouisL Present!

JudyW: I'm here.

SusanSi: aqui

JenniferCH: I'm back.

LynneW: Judy, what resource did you check out and what did you think about it?

**LynneW**: Thanks for checking in Jennifer.

**SusanR** . o O ( nice set of graphing tools to choose from...for all grade levels )

**Lynne W**: Have you used web-based graphing tools with your students before?

**JudyW**: I looked a little bit at the writing section and will need a lot more time to see what is available but it looks great. So many choices!

LynneW: Marlene, what did you check out?

**SusanR**: I have used create a graph.

**MarleneK**: I didn't look at any specific one, but what I appreciated the most was the descriptions beside each tool.

LynneW: OK

**LynneW**: Louis, please share about the tools you looked at.

LouisL: I looked at Teamviewer

**LynneW**: What does it do and how would you use it instructionally?

**LouisL**: and was reading the drawing board tools - Teamviewer should allow me to view another person's computer from mine

**LouisL**: from helping my dad remotely with a problem to a student

LouisL: troubleshooting or seeing what they are seeing

**LynneW**: OK - do you see any challenges introducing this tool to your students?

**LouisL**: my students are graduate students getting a masters - so in the worst case the challenge might be having them get help installing (from their children)

LouisL smiles

**LynneW**: I ask because my graduate students hated the idea of allowing someone access to their computers.

MarleneK: Privacy issues

LynneW: Seemed like an open door to problems from their point of view.

LouisL: my students have enjoyed it since it is for troubleshooting

LynneW: Great

LouisL: and they can control who can or cannot get in

**LynneW**: Susan, what tools did you check out?

LouisL: not this product but another - so this might be good

LynneW: Susan Si

**SusanSi**: I saw the edublog for teachers

**LynneW**: What caught your attention?

SusanSi: I need ideas for using these sites in my curriculum

**LynneW**: How would you use it?

**LynneW**: I have extensive experience with instructional blogging.

**Sus anSi**: I might get them to discuss the science lesson we did that day

**LynneW**: We can talk off-line if this is a topic you are interested in.

LouisL: I may tap you as that resource too Lynne

SusanSi: sure

**LynneW**: The best part of this group is finding new resources and talking together about strategies for how the tools can be used.

MarleneK nods nods nods.

**LynneW**: Anyone is welcome to connect with me.

**LynneW**: One last resource - my PK-12 Ed Tech News and Resources Blog

LynneW: CU-Online http://cuonline.blog-city.com

**MarleneK**: In the Presentation category.. the description for Thumbstacks looks good.

**LynneW**: Please feel free to use it and recommend it.

**LynneW**: Marlene - be right with you.

**LynneW**: Left hand column on my blog is a long list of "best of the best" resource links. Lots of great science, math, primary source, social studies, language arts resources.

**LynneW**: Center column has current news that probably won't be permanently linked.

**JenniferCH**: I've added you to my Google Reader.

**LynneW**: You may consider adding my blog to your RSS reader.

LynneW: Great

LynneW: Marlene, you wanted to share Thumbstacks with us.

**LynneW**: What does it do and how might you use it instructionally?

**MarleneK**: it doesn't seem to load, but what I've read about it, makes it a quick easy way to share presentations online. Another school used it to create a collaborative project

**MarleneK**: You can collaborate by getting a shared link.

**LynneW**: What type of projects come to mind as great collaborative experiences for students?

**LynneW**: Also, I want to plug using the Tapped In student campus.

**LynneW**: You can set up a room and invite your students in - and then the sky's the limit.

**LouisL**: anyone have experience with diigo?

**BJB2** . o O (Jeff Cooper leads a weekly tour of the student campus every Saturday)

**LynneW**: I like the idea of using the room for guest speakers, and for sharing data with others.

LynneW: I did. Limited

**BJB2** looks at the clock on the wall

**LynneW**: I would have to go back and remind myself.

**LynneW**: That's BJ's way of reminding me our session time has come to an end.

**LynneW**: I'll hang out to answer questions until everyone has gone.

**LynneW**: Thank you for spending your time here today.

**LynneW**: Please consider joining our group.

**JudyW**: This has been very interesting. I found Speakaboos which I want to explore right now. Thanks, Lynne, for sharing with us.

**LynneW**: Please consider returning to this group room to explore all the resources.

**LynneW**: My pleasure.

**JenniferCH**: Thanks for the resources.

LynneW: You bet.

LynneW: Good night.

**SusanSi**: Thank you, Lynne. I have a lot to learn! I'll be back. What ideas can you give me for instructional blogging?

**LynneW**: Who are your students?

**LynneW**: Age, and content area??

**SusanSi**: 4th graders math science TX history

**SusanSi**: I have 12 desktops in my room

SusanSi: all Macs

**LynneW**: Last year, I matched up my pre-service teachers with a class of students in Malaysia for a Global Warming project.

**SusanR**: Thanks Lynne. Much to explore!

**LynneW**: My student teachers were "critical friends" encouraging deeper thought in their writing on their individual blogs.

**SusanSi**: we are doing Journey North-planting tulips

**LynneW**: You can create a destination blog for the class that contains information to support a learning activity.

LynneW: You can take the time to get all your students creating their own blogs.

**LynneW**: That is taking on a lot but students can find it very enriching.

**LynneW**: You can find a subject matter specialist who answers student questions on the class blog.

**LouisL** apologizes a student is skyping me for video conference - will be back

**SusanSi**: is this like "journaling"

LynneW: OK

**LynneW**: Journaling and commenting.

**LynneW**: Blogs are designed for entries to have opportunity for ready comments.

**SusanSi**: keeping them on the appropriate topic might be a challenge?

**LynneW**: Of course, you can determine what comments actually see the light of day.

**LynneW**: It is a learned skill.

**LynneW**: You have to remind and remind.

**MarleneK**: You could create a classroom blog, and have a Feature of the Week section which is written by a student.

**LynneW**: Teachers seem to have the best luck when they have student blog writing "on approval only" status.

SusanSi: ok

**LynneW**: Until they can prove they can stay on topic, and add value to a discussion, their comments are only released when the teacher determines them to be approved.

**SusanSi**: how would I get them started?

**LynneW**: Once a student consistently receives approval for blog entries without further work needed, the teacher can set the control for that student so no monitoring is required.

**LynneW**: If their performance doesn't measure up later, you can simply turn the control off and begin with them again. Good consequence.

**LynneW**: I would start with a class blog.

**SusanR**: Thanks again Lynne

**SusanR** left the room (signed off).

LynneW: You can seed the blog with reading and follow up with a provocative question.

**LynneW**: Students reply by comment.

**SusanSi**: ok-I think I might try that

LynneW: They will see their ideas "published" and quality should go up.

**LynneW**: Let me know how it goes if you do implement.

SusanSi: thank you so much!

**LynneW**: My pleasure.

SusanSi: good night

LynneW: Good night

**LouisL**: back in time to leave I see

**LynneW**: Thank you for adding value to our session today.

**MarleneK**: Thanks again Lynne, good night everyone.

**LynneW**: Please stay in touch.

LynneW: Bye Marlene

**LouisL**: have pleasant evening

**LynneW**: Great - what is your Twitter handle? Also delicious?
