LarryBa: Our discussion leader is Baba Brinkman from Vancouver

BabaGst32: Vancouver, BC

LarryBa: Perhaps we could briefly describe teaching assignments by way of intro

BabaGst32: a Canuck...

DavidWe laughs

DavidWe . o O (Les Canadiens!)

BJB2: I teach remedial communication in Pennsylvania

DavidWe: I'm David Weksler. I'm a HelpDesk volunteer and I lead a math education and technology discussion here. I'm in northern New Jersey, near New York City

LarryBa: I'm 11th grade English, public high school

LeoL: <<drummer, currently teaching social studies in a special ed school in NJ

BabaGst32: I haven't taught any courses, but I completed my M.A. in medieval lit about four years ago and I've been performing and recording literary rap (lit-hop) since then

DavidWe: very cool!

BJB2 agrees!

LarryBa: As moderator, I ask that you please let Baba make his comments until he is ready for further questions during the discussion.

BJB2 sits on her hands

LarryBa: We'll probably be pretty informal

LarryBa: Baba, could you begin by describing your work?

BabaGst32: I saw many parallels between Chaucer's poetry and hip-hop when I was a grad student (and aspiring rapper), so I've been trying to find ways to combine them. The Rap Canterbury Tales is a one-man show I've been performing where I re-create and channel Chaucer's pilgrims as modern rappers...

LarryBa nodding

BabaGst32: I have toured the show for the past four years, and last year it was published by Canada's leading independent literary press, Talon Books, as a facing page translation. I have already released it as a CD

DavidWe: Where can we someone buy it, Baba?

DavidWe . o O (Amazon?)

BabaGst32: And at this point I'm ready for any questions you might have. I am also interested to hear about what challenges you have encountered teaching Chaucer

BabaGst32: Amazon has the book and CD, or if you just want the music files you can get all of my albums from iTunes.

BabaGst32: Just search "baba brinkman"

DavidWe: cool, thanks

LarryBa: I'd like to hear some of these.

BJB2: I'm interested in hearing about how you overcome the bad rap rap has...especially gangsta rap

BabaGst32: My hope is that the book will make its way onto the curriculum for some Chaucer courses

BabaGst32: Mostly by not buying into the stereotype myself. I try to make my songs as conscious and entertaining as I can, using Chaucer's poetry as a model of this balance

LarryBa: What sorts of reactions do you get from your performances--from teachers and students?

BabaGst32: People do bring a lot of baggage to the table when it comes to rap, however, but I see this as an illusion of visibility. The most visible (highly publicized) rap also happens to be the most negative, misogynist, superficial, etc

BJB2 nods

BabaGst32: But this is more a quality of mass media and popular culture than rap as an art form, just like Hollywood movies and thriller fiction novels and prime time tv

DavidWe likes Grand Master Flash

BabaGst32: The reaction to my show has been overwhelmingly positive so far both from popular audiences at festivals and from teachers who use me as a hook to capture the interest of their students

LeoL: what do the kids think?

BabaGst32: But of course I always have to overcome the initial skepticism that people will have

BabaGst32: Kids doubt that I will be a "real rapper" - they assume I will be a nerdy academic who is just aping hip hop as a gimmick

BabaGst32: I have been aware of this trap for as long as I've been rapping, so I have taken care to pay my dues in the hip hop community by collaborating with other rappers and by battling (a la 8 Miler)

BJB2: and once they hear you?

BabaGst32: Once they hear me they tend to be converted

LarryBa nods appreciatively

LeoL: got to have the street cred good

DavidWe smiles

BabaGst32: Sometimes after performing the Chaucer show they will be impressed but still won't believe I'm a rapper. They will take me for an actor with good memory and timing who managed to come up with one good thing

BabaGst32: So often they will challenge me to a battle in front of the class, if there's a kid there who thinks he can rap and show me up

LarryBa: Could you speak to the relevancy of Chaucer today?

BabaGst32: I love it when this happens, because I have been battling for years and I can always chew them up, which gets everyone else there instantly into my corner

LeoL: yeah

LeoL: great

BabaGst32: Chaucer's insight is profound when it comes to relationships

BabaGst32: This might be about the relationships between men and women, or between rich and poor

BabaGst32: his poetry shows a profound empathy and understanding with the perspectives of different people, which I think has a great deal to teach us today in a divided world

BabaGst32: That's the genius of the "Tales" - it's unity in diversity

LarryBa: Granted, but I'm confessing straight up that I don't teach Chaucer and that he isn't taught in my high school...

LarryBa: should we?

BabaGst32: Chaucer has also taught me a great deal about the relationship between a performer and the audience, which I see as the central theme of the "Tales" - this awareness is also crucial to the rapper's trade

BabaGst32: Well, if you want to make kids feel like literature is cool and sexy, you couldn't do much better than Chaucer

BabaGst32: Which other poet has to have much of his material censored by more conservative high schools?

BabaGst32: While still being upheld as the model of an innovator and literary genius?

LarryBa is intrigued

BabaGst32: I have been prohibited from performing the Miller's Tale many times because of its content

LarryBa: I'll bet!

BabaGst32: Although in England it is taught as part of the required A-level curriculum

LarryBa: Is that just patriotism?

BabaGst32: more like liberalism

LarryBa: Do you use modern translation?

BabaGst32: Because there's no reason to choose the rudest tale to celebrate their literary heritage

BabaGst32: I take the original middle English as a guide, and I translate it into my own words

LarryBa: OK

BabaGst32: My goal is to make each tale as comprehensible as possible to a modern audience, whether they know anything about Chaucer or not

BabaGst32: But for those who are familiar with the original, there are loads of hidden gems I have worked into the text, references and allusions

BabaGst32: This was Chaucer's own approach to literature as well

LarryBa: Quaint...

BabaGst32: Accessible to everyone, but also full of depth, complexity, social commentary, and irony, all of which are only accessible to those who take the time to look for it

BabaGst32: Not that I'm presuming to be on his level, but I certainly do take his philosophy of literature as my model

LarryBa: How much Chaucer would you like to see as "enough" in the modern school curriculum?

DavidWe tries to remember how much Chaucer he read in high school

BabaGst32: I don't think there's room for much more than an overview and a few Tales

LarryBa: we have the reality of standards to deal with... time constraints...

BabaGst32: I'm not trying to make him a centerpiece, but I think students should definitely have an awareness of him and what he achieved for literature

LarryBa agrees

BabaGst32: A strong case has been made for his role as the wellspring of much of what followed him in terms of English verse

BabaGst32: Shakespeare is the figurehead of English literature for a good reason, but he inherited much from Chaucer

BabaGst32: Chaucer inherited a great deal as well, but not from many English poets

BabaGst32: His genius was to take the best of the continental literature and the classics and to refashion it in a distinctively English way, which had never really been done

LarryBa: Chaucer does delineate character well

BabaGst32: Shakespeare achieved more, but he also had more to work with

LeoL: How much do you update the characters? Are they still medieval, or 2007?

BabaGst32: I don't make any references to modern pop culture in the Tales, if that's what you're asking

BabaGst32: I try to capture the same tone and setting as Chaucer himself

LeoL: I think that's what I'm asking....

BabaGst32: So for instance the Pardoner's Tale is just about three drunks at a bar who go on a quest to find death

BabaGst32: The context for the story could just as easily be today as six hundred years ago, and it could be adapted to most cultures without many core changes either

LeoL: right nice job

BabaGst32: The themes of drunkenness, arrogance, avarice, betrayal, etc, are all fairly universal and proliferate in rap music as well

BabaGst32: Whereas the Knight's Tale takes place in ancient Greece, so there is a setting in mythological time that I had to retain

LeoL: I'm seeing your credibility as a rapper as central to the whole tour

LeoL: which is good

BabaGst32: It's definitely the only reason I can get teenagers to listen to me when I lecture them

LarryBa: How young an audience can understand and appreciate what you're doing?

BabaGst32: I tend not to go any younger than high school age

BabaGst32: So twelve and up, but even twelve is pushing it a little

LarryBa: What is your ideal audience?

LeoL: Baba I have to go, but I look forward to reading the rest of the transcript

BabaGst32: There is a lot of range in maturity at that age. Sometimes they lap it up, but I had a girl break down and cry because of the subject matter during my tour of the UK last summer

LeoL: good luck and thanks

LarryBa: Bye, Leo

BabaGst32: My ideal audience is both Chaucer literate and pop culture literate

LeoL: bye all

LeoL left the room (signed off).

BabaGst32: I really didn't write this specifically for teenagers, but ironically that has become my biggest audience

ShirleyAn joined the room.

LarryBa: Hi, Shirley

DavidWe waves to Shirley

BabaGst32: The original motivation for me was to bring Chaucer to a popular audience again in the spirit of his original lyricism

LarryBa: How extensively do you perform?

DavidWe likes that idea

BabaGst32: I toured about twenty seven weeks in 2006

BabaGst32: I did performances in schools, colleges and festivals in Australia, Canada (including Quebec), England, Northern Ireland, Scotland, and the USA (including the south)

BabaGst32: A good cross-section of the English-speaking world

BabaGst32: This year I am embarking on a similar tour

LarryBa: How does a school go about arranging for your services?

BabaGst32: Sometimes I have an agent, but other times they just contact me through my website (<u>www.babasword.com</u>) and ask about availability

BabaGst32: I'm based out of Vancouver so there are some limitations there

BabaGst32: What I've started to do is set up regional tours where I will make myself available to a given area for a given time frame, but it's all a bit of a juggle at the moment

BabaGst32: I'm performing in a high school in San Rafael, CA the day after tomorrow

LarryBa: How long and how much are you available to a typical school district when on tour?

BJB2: do you do residencies, Baba?

BabaGst32: I usually just try to make myself available to the extent that there is an interest and a budget to cover my costs

BabaGst32: I haven't done a residency yet, but that's something I'm definitely interested in for next year.

BJB2: cool

BabaGst32: If I could find a college that wanted to have me as an artist in residence for a year, that would mean I could be accessible to the whole region for that time

DavidWe smiles

BabaGst32: But I would have to have the freedom to travel still and work on other projects

DavidWe will check with some people at Swarthmore College

BabaGst32: I'd appreciate that - where is Swarthmore?

DavidWe: suburban Philadelphia

BabaGst32: Great, because that's definitely the part of the country I'd be interested in moving to for a bit

DavidWe: Friend of mine is a poet and one of the English Literature professors - she might be interested

DavidWe: Not sure who teaches Chaucer at the college, currently

LarryBa: Have you worked out of the Winnipeg area at all?

BabaGst32: I've had one expression of interest already from Washington University, but if I were to live there I might as well just be living in Vancouver

BabaGst32: No, I've actually never been to Winnipeg

DavidWe smiles

BabaGst32: I applied for the Fringe Festival there a few times, but never had any luck

BabaGst32: I will be performing in the Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto Fringe Festivals this summer

LarryBa: We're about 150 miles south from there

BabaGst32: Come see the show...

LarryBa: Toronto could be worth the trip!

BabaGst32: July 4-14

LarryBa: I'll put it on my calendar

LarryBa: Is there anything you'd like to tell us about the teaching of Chaucer, classroom observations on what works, what doesn't?

BabaGst32: I find pop culture references are a good way to give them a framework for approaching things.

BabaGst32: I try to find quotes from rappers or examples from movies that are thematically similar to whatever I'm talking about

BabaGst32: Like 50 Cent's motto: "Get Rich or Die Trying" which is a perfect summary of the main theme of the Pardoner's Tale

BabaGst32: The thing is, I haven't actually taken a Chaucer class in about five years

BabaGst32: all of the Chaucer classes I've been in since then are ones I've been leading, so I've really been able to set the agenda

BabaGst32: I was very lucky to have a series of brilliant English teachers that just got me more and more enthusiastic about the material, and that enthusiasm is infectious when I bring it to a performance

BabaGst32: But I can't say that Chaucer made a huge impression on me in high school

LarryBa: Chaucer has been squeezed out of the curriculum in many places. Any resources you recommend for re-instituting a program?

BabaGst32: A little book called "The Rap Canterbury Tales"...

LarryBa laughs

DavidWe takes a look at the clock on the wall

BabaGst32: It has the original Middle English printed on facing pages with the rap translation, and it's illustrated so you can see what's happening in each scene

LarryBa: Anything else you'd like to have recorded in the transcript?

DavidWe: Is there a web page with some information about you and the project, Baba?

BabaGst32: Just that everything I've talked about here is also touched on in the introduction to my book

BabaGst32: It's based on my masters thesis research and sums up my interpretation of Chaucer as well as a new theory of hip hop's place in the history of literature.

BabaGst32: And there are lots of gems for teachers to use bring Chaucer to life

BabaGst32: You can find information at my website: <u>www.babasword.com</u>

DavidWe: Thanks

BabaGst32: The book can be ordered online from amazon.com

BabaGst32: And my other rap songs are all available at the iTunes Music Store

BJB2 is downloading the CDs from iTunes

BabaGst32: My most recent album is called "Lit-Hop"

LarryBa: Thanks so much for taking time to explain your program for us, Baba.

LarryBa: I'm ordering your book as we speak!

DavidWe smiles

BabaGst32: Thanks for inviting me. It's been enjoyable.

BJB2 applauds loudly...this has been inspirational, Baba! Thanks!

DavidWe: Would you be interested in doing this again, Baba?

DavidWe: We would try to get a few more folks to show up

BabaGst32: Sure

DavidWe looks at BJ

LarryBa: Best wishes on your tour.

BJB2 looks at Larry

BabaGst32: I just need proper notice so I can schedule it in

LarryBa: I'm in...

DavidWe: Good luck traveling to northern California

BabaGst32: Also, if any teachers are interested in bringing the performance to their school they should just contact me through the website

DavidWe: I can give you some places to go to in Berkeley, if you need to find some good coffee places

BabaGst32: Thanks!

DavidWe smiles

BJB2: Larry, you and Baba work on a date and I'll put it on the calendar

DavidWe thinks it is a plan

LarryBa: Sounds great!

BabaGst32: I'm going to go get some food now I think...

DavidWe: Thanks very much, Baba. Take care

LarryBa: Thanks, everyone.

BJB2 waves goodnight

BJB2: Thanks, Larry

DavidWe: Good night folks

DavidWe: Thanks, Larry

LarryBa: Night!
