I think another good way to do this would be to see what someone else might be thankful for, such as going to a nursing home and asking the people living there to tell the students what they are thankful for.

BonnieLC: I like that there is a monthly activity section.

BjB: the next site is for older kiddos and delves into the thankfulness a little more deeply

BjB: Attitude of Gratitude PowerPoint

BonnieLC: I agree- what a nice way to connect/share ideas with others.

DanielleNR: I think if you wanted to use this with younger kids a picture book would be the same or even a collage

BjB: it would be fun to scan the pictures and make a ppt for the class, too

DanielleNR: Then you could get the parents involved as well

DanielleNR: to help the students pick out pictures from home

BonnieLC: good ideas.

BjB: The next resource is on kindness...always a good topic
